

The Problem: Exponential increase in migration with no corresponding international governance programme

International migration has increased from 82 million in 1970 to over 200 million in 2007.

Implications: Lack of rights for migrants

'Millions of migrants are forced into the legal limbo of irregular entry and employment and suffer discrimination and marginalisation.' (Stephen Castles)

What the research suggests: Establish a World Migration Authority

Castles recommends the creation of a World Migration Authority within the United Nations Framework following the People's Global Action on Migration, Development and Human Rights demands:
